I also would like to take this opportunity to express my deep gratitude to the people and the Government of Egypt for the warm support they extend to scientific and cultural exchange between Japan and Egypt and also to Cairo University for its leadership to enhance further our mutual understanding and to deepen our solidarity in culture, education and research fields.

If Alfred Nobel dreamed of peace, I would like to say that SESAME will promote human resources development in the region and it will have positive impact at each country's level as well and, it will contribute to confidence building in the region. History tells us that human resources development enhances sound competition and the spirit of cooperation, which in turn give birth to science. I may add that science would stagnate with exclusiveness, enclosure and monopoly. Peace as well.
